

First SP Golf Tournament & Dinner a Huge Success

Once announced, the first ever Sonoma Pines Golf Classic held July 21 quickly sold out. As reported in June, **Bob & Marlene** Waterfield, owners of Budget Blinds Kelowna and long time SP residents announced their company would be the lead sponsor for the golf tournament and dinner. Their generous donation provided seed financing for the event, but it was up to the community to 'make it happen'. One stipulation, all net proceeds were to go toward the purchase of equipment for the new Clubhouse fitness room. With that in mind, the Waterfields approached Tom McEwen, SP Council Chair, to see if he'd organize the event. Tom, despite having a full agenda of other community related projects, accepted the challenge and convinced his wife Gail to be the co-lead on making the event a success. interview with Tom McEwen is printed below.

The golf tournament had a full roster of 92 players (13 teams), with a Texas Scramble format played over the front 9 at Two Eagles. Expectedly there were many low scores but the overall winner

was Team 3, pictured below, with a low net score of 28. After the game, drinks flowed and a delicious BBQ steak dinner was served at the Clubhouse to a happy crowd of 120 residents. As usual, the staff of Nineteen Bar & Grill (at Two Eagles Golf) did an outstanding job of preparing and serving the food. Thanks to the generosity of donors, an abundance of prizes were won by many of the attendees (see sponsor donor list in box, below). Once all the numbers were in, a profit of \$5,500 was made for the community Clubhouse.

Interview with Tom McEwen:

Recently **Ed Dorosz**, Sonoma Sun editor, sat down with **Tom McEwen** to get his perspective on the Golf Tournament and Dinner.

ED. Tom, you and Gail are busy people and involved in many other aspects of SP. What inspired you to take the lead in organizing a Golf Tournament?

TM: It was an opportunity to bring everyone together at the Clubhouse – for everyone to meet, socialize, team-build, so people could come together. Also, it was an opportunity to showcase the Clubhouse and its capabilities, particularly for the many new residents that haven't seen it up till then.

ED. What was this golf tournament supposed to accomplish?

TM. Well firstly, Budget Blinds wanted to give back to the community in a meaningful way. SP helped make them a success, and it was time to return the favour. Secondly, the Waterfield's clearly stated that all profits were to be used to help buy equipment for the new fitness room at the clubhouse, which would encourage our residents to remain active and healthy. And lastly, it was to have more residents involved on a' team basis' to make a community-wide event fun and successful.

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ED. So in the end, what were the results?

TM. Obviously we were supposed to generate a profit, which we did. A total of \$5500 was raised, better than expected.

The tournament & dinner was completely sold out, all to SP residents, which was great. At first we thought we might need to open the golf to non-residents, but that wasn't necessary. The whole thing went off without a hitch. Everyone that registered came to play and all volunteers showed up and did as promised. That was gratifying.

The post-game dinner was especially fun, despite the heat. Nothing cold drinks couldn't solve. The food was fantastic, and the generosity of local businesses and individuals that provided numerous prizes made a lot of us walk away even happier.

ED. What were the main challenges in making this event a reality?

TM. Without a doubt, it had to be finding the right balance of time to share amongst the many many other things going on. As you can imagine, there's a hundred things to orchestrate to get a major event like this through to completion. In the end, it was all worth it.

ED. How receptive was the business community in helping sponsor the event and donate prizes?

TM. Very receptive. It really wasn't an issue. Everyone we asked stepped forward. In fact, even some individuals voluntarily donated prizes. No one turned us down, especially when they learned of the community nature of the event and what we were trying to accomplish.

ED. I know the community and certainly the participants appreciated the generous time & efforts of everyone involved in helping pull-off this event. It was great fun, the food was wonderful

and the weatherman co-operated. In light of that, do you think SP should have this as an annual event, and if so, what changes do you think could make it even better?

TM. Yes, it will be an annual event as long as it's supported by our community, particularly by the volunteers, which sometimes don't get the full credit they deserve.

In terms of changes or improvements, we'll probably change the timing to late August or early September when the weather should be cooler. Perhaps we'll do a 'shotgun start' and possibly play 18 holes. We'll see what the community prefers. On the food and drinks side, we'll make adjustments to the menu, perhaps offer a choice of 2 entrees, and come up with some better efficiencies.

ED. Do you have any closing thoughts to add?

TM. Now that we have some experience

and a template to work from, it should be easier to improve on next year's or

similar events. And importantly we welcome any and all suggestions from the community. Please let us know.


