The strong gusting winds didn't subside causing a bit of havoc with the fairways and with the KAL Tire and Flight Centre sponsor tents, but all-in-all it was wonderful to be on the links. The awards dinner, catered by Dine-by-Design, was attended by 94 guests filling the main salon to capacity.

Edward Dorosz, chair of the 2015 Golf Organizing Committee, thanked the 16 sponsors that generously donated \$4,400 in support of the event. Tom McEwen, committee co-chair, thanked all the volunteers that have worked diligently since February 9 to bring the event to reality.



Prizes up for grabs totalled \$4,200, with \$3,300 of that graciously donated by various local businesses. In addition to the golf team and individual golf awards, several free door prizes were given away. The luckiest of the raffle ticket holders walked away with 14 prizes totaling almost \$2,200. Between draws, our very own comedienne & co-MC, Sharon McNichol, entertained us.

Golf challenge & team awards were presented by co-MC Ivars Dravinskis. Team 19 had the Lowest Gross Score; Dixie & Dave Michie, Jim & Debbie Harris get their names engraved on this year's trophy. All the team photos as well as a number of candid photos were taken throughout the day. We hope to have those posted to the website soon; at minimum, a photo CD can be

made available to view.

In the end, the event generated a net profit of \$5,747, which will be used for the betterment of our Clubhouse. A great big 'Thank You' to everyone that turned out and supported this event.

Chief Louie Visits Sonoma Pines

Governments on route to becoming the foremost first nation government in Canada. Initially he discussed the fact that WFN people and their ancestors have been here for thousands of years and their progress to self-government. He talked about Native entitlement to the lands, the assertion of their Native rights and title to access water from Okanagan Lake and the extent of their traditional territories from the south central interior of B.C. to north central Washington State. He reviewed the history of their selfgovernment, progress in developing tax and infrastructure and current projects underway on WFN land. Chief Louie reinforced to the audience that financially, WFN is one of the strongest First Nation communities in Canada with a goal of eventually being totally selfsufficient.

He was well briefed on a few of our issues including our Carrington Road and Sonoma Pines intersection, rumoured

plans (only rumours nothing concrete) on the land next to our entrance and some of our weed/fire hazard concerns. Chief Louie responded to a few questions from residents and suggested we may need to engage the province to increase the priority on our intersection.

This was Chief Robert Louie's first invite to address Sonoma Pines residents and has committed to return on a regular basis. He is very impressed with our community and the clubhouse and stated it is the premier strata complex in Westbank First Nation.

Thanks to Rob Taylor and Sonoma Pines Council for putting together this first meeting.

Update on Fire Interface

Last month we reported on discussions with WFN and West Kelowna Fire Department in regards to the weeds and wildfire risk along Carrington Road. Chief

Louie referred to this issue during his visit with Sonoma Pines residents on September 21 and mentioned that WFN may have to introduce a new law to ensure enforcement. SPHOA Council has requested a meeting with WFN, through WFN Advisory Council representative Gord Couch, to stay abreast of progress and discuss the next steps.

Safety and Security

A note to residents of Sonoma Pines - The R.C.M.P. have advised me that there has been an increase in thefts of vehicles and thefts from vehicles in West



Kelowna. In a number of cases the vehicles have been left unlocked or valuables have been visible left on the console or seat. Please lock and remove items from your vehicle so you are not the next victim.

It has come to the attention of your Safety and Security Committee that a number of suspicious occurrences have been taking place in our community - namely prowler complaints. This past Monday night Aug. 21st at approx. 10:00 pm, a couple out walking their dog noted a male subject dressed in a dark hoody wandering the area of Serrento Lane and Sonoma Pines Dr. When the suspect noted the couple walking the dog, he immediately turned around and walked the opposite direction and disappeared. The R.C.M.P. were called but could not locate the subject. A second prowler complaint was received from a home located on Sonoma Pines Dr. (behind our clubhouse) this occurrence took place prior to the Aug. 21st complaint (details to be obtained). This occurrence was also reported to the R.C.M.P. but a subject was not located. A reminder to all - Report all suspicious persons or activity to the R.C.M.P. and Associated Property Management (APM).

Golf Course Changes

Two Eagles Golf course will be undergoing a number of changes to improve safety and playability. Chairman Rob Taylor spoke to the residents of Mesa Vista outlining the major changes being made:

1. Remove the hill in from the first green to ensure golfers can see people walking to the second tee.

Reconfigure the 3rd hole to move the 2. tee box back and lower it close to the 17th tee box and re-contour the fairway towards the 5th fairway to make it more difficult to cut the corner. Also remove the cart path.

3. The design objective on the 5th fairway is to encourage golfers to aim their shots away from homes by improving the landing area away from our property line and discourage golfers from aiming along the property line by introducing more and tougher hazards. The 5th fairway will be levelled by moving earth from the upper side and sculpting into the reconfigured area next to the 3rd fairway. To keep golfers away from the left side of the fairway they will be removing the cart path, planting fescue and reconfiguring the sand traps. They will also be planting fescue on a small portion of our side of the fence. The intention is to retain the fencing as is, but should a portion of our common land be needed they may relocate a portion of the fence a few feet.

4. Refine the 5^{th} tee box slightly for Two Eagles to incorporate it into their maintenance.

Sonoma Pines Council will be working with Two Eagles and Carrington Development to formalize the boundaries and are looking at other mitigation solutions for residents around the golf course. Construction on the 5th fairway should be starting early to mid October. More information will be forthcoming as the solutions are developed.

Hiking the Pacific Crest Trail - George and Gail Forshaw

On April 21, 2015 we started our epic journey to walk 4,265 km from the US/Mexican border to Canada. We followed the National Scenic Trail known as the Pacific Crest Trail (PCT).

Planning and preparation for our hike started a year ago. Logistics, gear lists, supplies were carefully planned and guide books reviewed. Our journey took us through the deserts of Southern California, the mountain passes of the High Sierras, the southern Cascade Range of Northern California and the subdued Volcanic landscape of Oregon.

Unfortunately an injury ended our hike at the Oregon/Washington border. We lived on the trail for 4 months, hiking daily with our 35 pound backpacks for 2900 km. We hiked in blazing hot sun, warm sunshine, wind, rain, hail and snow. The trail we walked varied from dirt, sand, rocks and dust. At times it was easy, at times difficult, at times monotonous but always a challenge.


We had views and vistas that took our breath away. We dealt with aches and pains, blisters and mosquitos that drove us insane.
